The medium I chose was water colors as I love the way the paper pulls the paint, which can actually create colors that make the painting "pop," therefore, there are no mistakes. Painting with

Cerebral Palsy can be very challenging but also so much fun.

The challenges were part of the fun as it made me have to get creative in the type of tools I used to create some of the aspects of the painting. For example, an eraser end of a pencil to make the ends of the logs in the woodpile, the edge of a credit card to make the metal roof lines and a sponge to make the bushes in the foreground as well as the fall color in the trees. Being that I only had a black and white photo of the house and some of the details weren't very clear, I used my artistic eye to turn it into color. This helps me turn my paintings into one-of-a-kind art pieces. I am thankful to be part of the Genesee Health System as they offer the HAB waiver and Self-Determination programs which allow me to be out in my community and a member of the Swartz Creek Art Guild where I take watercolor classes. I don't let a disability hold me back from doing what I love to do!

ANNUAL REPORT TO THE COMMUNITY 2017



2017 continued to be a challenging year for the Hint Community, and GHS was no different.

The Hint Water Crisis has not ended, and will not for a long time. The headlines have faded, but the fear, anxiety and anger will be with the community well into the future.

For our part, we continue to be very involved in most aspects of the recovery, and will be here throughout the ordeal. Clinical staff, administrators, and outreach staff are active every day, helping the community recover. New programs and staff have been added, and more are planned, as we anticipate ongoing challenges, and possibly new ones from the effects of the lead crisis.

We have seen a steady increase in individuals seeking assistance through our Access Center, and most programs have seen increases in volume. We are starting to notice a steady uptick in some of our standard measures of childhood wellbeing. These increases are not surprising, but disturbing none the less.

The community mental health system on a state wide basis is still dealing with attempts to change the model, and integrate with the Medicaid health plans. There was legislation introduced that called for pilot sites, to work with the health plans to develop a model for the state. This direction does hold promise of better integration of physical and behavioral health, but our system is rightly suspicious, as we do not want to lose what makes us special-our consumer first and public policy driven system. We will keep fighting to preserve these, no matter what model wins. We are not sure what our role will be, but GHS has always been a leader in new initiatives, and we are confident that we will be heavily involved in the process.

In spite of all these challenges and unknowns, our commitment to our mission has not and will not waiver. We are here for our consumers, our families, and our community. No matter how long the water crisis exists, no matter what model is chosen for our system, no matter how much demand for services increase, we will be here.

It is our mission, and our commitment to the community.


Our Vision



2017 Report Card Definitions

Average quality audit score: Average score for quality audits of provider's programs.

<u>Inpatient follow up:</u> Rate at which consumers are seen within 3 weekdays (24 hours for ACT and home based).

Outcome measure completion: Proportion of consumers with state required outcomes measures current. (For FY 2017, this refers to the CAFAS and PECFAS measures.)

<u>Crisis Utilization:</u> Average number of days of crisis care per month of enrollment in the provider's programs. In general, lower numbers represent better performance.

Decreased crisis utilization: Percentage of consumers who: 1) have fewer days of crisis service in the three months after program discharge compared to the three months before or 2) maintain zero crisis utilization from before to after services.

Self-reported outcomes: Proportion of consumers who noted Improvements in their lives or symptoms on GHS' annual consumer survey.

With our mobile office, we bring healthcare. into the community. We're here to support you, offering medical and emotional support along the way.





GHS AND MOTT CO-LOCATE SOME CHILDREN'S SERVICES

Mott Children's Health Center and Genesee Health System announced that they are collaborating to co-locate portions of Genesee Health System's Child & Family Services program within the Mott Children's Health Center building to enhance the delivery of behavioral health care to children in the Genesee County area.

The Mott Children's Health Center provides medical, dental and behavioral services to eligible children in Genesee County, while Genesee Health System is the public mental health provider for the county. This collaboration represents a powerful combination of skills to meet the healthcare needs of area children and will offer easier referrals between organizations, resulting in better service care and treatment for children and families. Colocating helps to increase accessibility for the community and individuals seeking services, expands behavioral services available to Mott patients, and provides integrated health care that will further help in reducing barriers to seeking mental health services.

GHS IN THE COMMUNITY

Our speaker bureau is available and talks to many groups per month about mental health, resources, signs and symptoms and much more.
